Mission

Okanagan College Foundation helps students gain access to education by developing scholarships and bursaries, and raising support for capital projects at Okanagan College. The Foundation receives and manages charitable gifts and builds relationships with communities to foster greater awareness of and support for Okanagan College.

Success this year is most evident in the lives of the students who benefited from over one million dollars in program support and over 1320 financial awards disbursed from the Foundation. This is an increase of nearly \$400,000 and 592 awards last year. We were able to do this with the significant support of new donors, especially the Southern Interior Development Initiative Trust (SIDIT), which made a three-year \$1.43 million commitment to supporting students entering the trades, engineering technologies, and nursing programs as well as high school students enrolled in dual credit programs at the College. We received the first installment of \$478,000 this past year.



In a year marked by a turbulent economy and declining portfolio values, it is a credit to our Directors and their policy of conservative management that we have also been able to maintain disbursements on our endowments, when so many other Foundations have struggled. The beneficiaries are students, who are struggling in this economy, returning to school, and are in need of even greater financial support. However good this news, our Foundation's assets have been affected by the downturn in the economy and we anticipate that the situation will turn around in 2009/2010. Thanks to the generous support from the College for our operations, we also have the added advantage of having no administrative or fundraising expenses charged against the revenues of the endowment.


With enough generated investment income, the Foundation Board made the decision in December to disburse 3.5 per cent of its endowments, based on the current value at just over \$6.5 million. The investment policy recognizes the expectation of donors to provide funds for scholarships as the first priority. The asset allocation in the investment portfolio is varied enough so there is sufficient interest and dividends to continue to support scholarships and bursaries in 2009/10.

Since 2003, Okanagan College Foundation and its donors have distributed over \$5.1 million in scholarships and support for programs and equipment.




Kelsi Clarke is excited about receiving the Gisele Critchley Memorial French Studies Award

Okanagan College's commitment to offering the best educational opportunities in an environmentally sustainable environment is rising to the next level with the construction of the \$28 million Centre of Excellence in Sustainable Building Technologies & Renewable Energy Conservation – expected to lead the province and country in the training and retraining of practitioners in the construction of green buildings.

The Centre of Excellence promise is three fold: bringing a total of 900 students to the Penticton campus, including more than 650 new students; providing 8,500 square meters of additional space. The carbon footprint will be reduced as a result of the latest in green building technologies being used in construction. It will be a sustained major economic driver in the region through the buying power of construction and more students, faculty and staff.

Unlike any building or post-secondary institution in Canada, the Centre will provide a learning experience that will take place in a living, breathing, real-world classroom because at every turn, students will be surrounded by the latest in sustainable building technologies. As a result, graduates will help



meet the world-wide demand for the latest in sustainable construction techniques and energy conservation. The building will also serve as a research hub for the development and commercialization of sustainable construction breakthroughs by our faculty, staff and students and will provide incubator space for start-up companies.

The Penticton campus will be redefined. For the first time, all faculty and students will be situated on the Penticton campus creating a true sense of community and place. The Centre will bring together students, teachers and industries in a way never before experienced. Combining existing and new programming, the Penticton campus will create one-stop teaching, learning and research. The already strong human kinetics program will expand to help meet the Okanagan healthcare, sport fitness and sport tourism needs.

The additional space will allow 10 new programs to start, attracting staff and students to the South Okanagan. These students will then take these learned latest techniques and technologies to the marketplace. The Centre will also draw construction personnel for upgrading in green building techniques. Surprisingly there is little ongoing training currently available, yet there are billions of dollars worth of economically inefficient and environmentally damaging properties in Canada alone.

Additional students mean additional faculty and staff who all will help drive the economy through their buying power. New and enhanced programs will give the South Okanagan/Similkameen, indeed the entire region and country, a new generation of carbon conscious tradespeople, technologists and builders. These graduates will take into the community the latest green technologies that our world is demanding.

The \$5 million regional campaign, chaired by Jim Henderson, a retired businessman from Penticton, is an opportunity to contribute to a unique and sustainable initiative that will place the Penticton campus on the world construction map for green buildings. It is also an opportunity for donors to participate in giving our students an unparalleled learning experience that will stay with them for life.

She began her education at Okanagan College taking English language classes, then moved on to a Continuing Studies course that gave her the skills to work sterilizing surgical instruments at Kelowna General Hospital. The single mom will graduate from the LPN program this August and hopes to start further training to realize her other dream of becoming an operating nurse. The Centre for Learning

When it opens to students this autumn, the Centre for Learning will help address a critical space shortage at the Kelowna campus. A modern, energy efficient facility, the Centre for Learning will blend social space with classrooms, library space, support services and group study areas. The five-storey building adds 6,375 square meters to the campus, to become the largest and most technologically advanced and environmentally responsible building at Okanagan College. It will be heated in part through a heat recovery system linked to the City's waste water treatment plant. Built to LEED Gold standards, it attaches via a two-storey atrium to the library, which will also undergo some renovations. The new Centre's large windows and architectural details feature the Centre of Dialogue in the atrium, and create a contemporary and elegant atmosphere. It is estimated that the building will have over one million visits annually. As part of the \$12.5 million Okanagan College Campaign, the Foundation is seeking \$1.5 million to help equip the new Centre and refurbish the library.

The sold out celebration recognizing the career and life work of former Okanagan-Westside MLA Rick Thorpe, resulted in more than \$28,000 worth of funding that will directly benefit Okanagan College and UBC Okanagan students in the region. He received the Canadian Medal of Achievement for the top marks in Canada upon graduation from the Ch.F.C. program. In the past 38 years, Ron has been actively involved in a number of organizations including the Estate Plan-

ning Council of Kelowna as past President, the Gyro Club of Kelowna, the Central Okanagan Foundation He has a strong team of professionals and at the top of the list is Priscilla who has been actively involved in Russell & Associates for over 24 years, overseeing all administration and accounting to keep the office running smoothly.

Ron and Priscilla’s life insurance policy names the Foundation as the owner and beneficiary of the \$140,000 death benefit. Ron says they are motivated to support Okanagan College because “they realize that Canada is going to have a desperate shortage of skilled workers, especially in the trades and we have an equal need for well-trained nurses and entrepreneurs in business.” He is also aware of the realities of aging. “We’re going to all get old and one day we’re going to need people to take care of us. Having more hospital beds will only help if we have the skilled people with them”.

A gift of life insurance can offer an affordable way to create a significant legacy at Okanagan College. It can be as easy as transferring ownership of an existing or new policy to the Okanagan College Foundation. You receive a tax receipt for premiums paid after the date of transfer. You can also name Okanagan College Foundation as a beneficiary of your policy – the resulting tax credit will reduce estate taxes and increase the after-tax value of your estate for other beneficiaries.

SOME OPTIONS:

1. Donating an existing policy that is fully paid.

You may donate a paid-up life insurance policy by naming Okanagan College Foundation the irrevocable owner and beneficiary of your policy. The College will immediately issue a donation receipt for the policy's cash surrender value, plus any accumulated dividends and interest.

2. Transferring ownership of an existing policy with premiums still owing.

You may gift an existing policy on which premiums are still being paid by transferring ownership to the Okanagan College Foundation. The Foundation will issue a donation receipt for the cash surrender value of the policy. In addition, when you make further premium payments, the Foundation will issue an annual charitable receipt for the value of the premiums you pay. In this case, Okanagan College Foundation becomes irrevocably designated as the owner and beneficiary of the existing policy.

3. By establishing a new policy that designates Okanagan College Foundation as the owner and beneficiary.

With a new policy, any premiums you pay are a tax credit. This means that you are able to claim the premiums as a charitable donation on your tax return. Again the Okanagan College Foundation is the owner and beneficiary of the policy.

4. By naming the Okanagan College Foundation as the beneficiary of your insurance policy.

You may choose to retain ownership of your policy and name Okanagan College Foundation as the direct beneficiary in your will and, upon your passing, your estate will receive a tax receipt for the value of the policy. Any premium payments on such a policy would not be eligible for a tax credit.

Benefits of making a gift of life insurance to Okanagan College Foundation:

- Receive a tax receipt
- Avoid probate (gifts of life insurance are less susceptible to being contested than a charitable bequest, and provide privacy)
- Designate your gift to a College priority that meets your interest, such as scholarships, capital projects, and specific programs.
