This guide is based on the 8th edition (2016) of the *MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers*. For further explanation and for more examples, please consult the *Handbook*, which is available in <u>print</u>, and the <u>*MLA Style Center*</u>, which is online.

MLA style includes **in-text citations** throughout your work and a **works cited list** at the end of your work, which provides full details about your cited sources.

Works Cited list

Works Cited entries should be organized alphabetically and formatted with a hanging indent, like the example on the second-last page of this guide. See the <u>MLA Style Center</u> for formatting details.

Works Cited entries may contain the following elements:

1	Author/creator.	E.g., writer, editor, artist, director.
2	Title of source.	Titles of sources that are part of a larger work are in "quotation marks." Titles of independent works are in <i>italics</i> .
3	Title of container,	E.g., a journal is the container for an article. A single source may have multiple containers. E.g., a journal article in a database has two containers: the journal and the database.
4	Other contributors,	E.g., editors, translators.
5	Version,	E.g., a specific edition of a book.
6	Number,	E.g., a volume of a book, or a volume and issue of a journal article.
7	Publisher,	The organization responsible for producing the work or making it public.
8	Publication date.	See the examples in this guide for date variations and formats.
9	Location,	E.g., page numbers, DOI (digital object identifier), URL. When a DOI is provided, it should be used instead of a URL.
10	Optional elements.	E.g., the original date of publication for a republished work, the source type for "unexpected" formats such as lectures, the date of access for a webpage.

Note: The examples in this guide are colour-coded to match each of the elements above.

In-text citations (see p. 54-58 & sec. 3, MLA Handbook)

In-text citations are usually structured like this: (Author's Last Name page(s) cited).

If your source has **no page numbers** (e.g. a sound recording or a webpage), then no page numbers can be given in your in-text citation. For time-based media such as sound recordings or videos, times or time ranges should be included.

Anatomy of a Citation

This example describes the elements of a citation. It is based on a journal article found online using one of the library's databases.
