

### Answering the Urgent Call for Childcare

By pursuing higher education, parents can transform their lives and the lives of their families.

Once they graduate, they'll have cultivated skillsets that allow them to improve their employment prospects, fill critical skill gaps and make meaningful contributions to communities throughout the North Okanagan.

However, many parents face barriers that prevent them from going back to school. Their educational aspirations are often delayed (or even halted) by the shortage of local childcare options.

Student parents who don't have access to quality care are also more likely to struggle with anxiety and depression, which can lead to poor school performance and higher rates of withdrawal.

What's more, even when offered childcare placements, financial barriers can get in the way. A recent study commissioned by the City of Vernon found that the two leading issues for local parents are lack of childcare availability and cost of care.

According to the Institute for Women's Policy Research, 88% of student parents are living near or at the poverty line. As a result, the cost of childcare deters many from pursuing postsecondary education.

To address these issues, Okanagan College is building the Sunflower Childcare Centre / smúkwa?xň scəcəmalla itskn snma?maya?tn on our Vernon Campus.

Affordable childcare will be offered through programs like the \$10-a-Day childcare initiative or the Child Care Fee Reduction initiative. It will be operated by Maven Lane, a well-respected non-profit childcare provider whose certified, experienced staff already have 550 local children in their high-quality care.

While the new Centre will prioritize seats for students it will also be open to community, and will increase the total number of spaces available locally.

We need community support to complete and equip this beautiful new 44-seat childcare centre with furnishings, supplies, and a creative outdoor space where the kids can play and learn.



#### What's in a name?

The Sunflower Childcare Centre / smúkwa?xn scacamalla itskn snma?maya?tn was named by leadership donors Lloyd Davies and Janet Armstrong, who were inspired by the symbolism of sunflowers, in particular, the Okanagan Sunflower / smúkwa?xn a vibrant yellow wildflower that dots the hillside on Okanagan College's Vernon Campus. This stunning location overlooks Kalamalka lake, has trails linking to Okanagan College's Indigenous garden, and provides the perfect space for the Centre's curated outdoor play areas.

The Okanagan Sunflower, also known as the Arrowleaf Balsamroot, is a beloved and beautiful marker of spring for many locals. It also carries great significance for Indigenous communities throughout the region. Almost every part of the flower is edible, and its fragrant roots contain anti-bacterial and anti-fungal properties that make it a powerful plant medicine. In other words, it carries within its blossoms the power to nourish and within its roots the power to heal.

What better name to give an on-campus childcare centre designed to help students and their families bloom and to support them as they work to cultivate deep roots in communities across the North Okanagan.
